# School Climate Audit: Measuring Positivity and Stability

This audit tool is designed to help schools evaluate the positivity and stability of their organizational climate based on the six climate categories and their components. The tool combines a quantitative assessment and qualitative openended questions to provide a comprehensive understanding of the current climate. Leaders can use the results to identify strengths and areas for improvement.

### **Quantitative Assessment**

Use the following scale to rate each statement:

1 = Strongly disagree, 2 = Disagree, 3 = Neutral, 4 = Agree, 5 = Strongly agree

5. **Calculate scores:** Compute the average score for each component and category to identify areas of strength and improvement.

6. **Track longitudinal climate data:** Periodically administer the climate assessment using recent data to interpret the stability or volatility of the climate.

- 8. **Plan improvements:** Use lower-scoring components as focal points for climate improvement initiatives, guided by qualitative feedback from staff.

The following qualitative assessment provides open-ended questions aligned with each category and its components. These reflective prompts encourage deeper insights into the perceptions, experiences, and nuances behind the quantitative scores.

### **Table Key**

- **Team reflections:** Record individual and collective responses during your discussion.
- **Recurring themes and key insights:** Summarize any common points or patterns that emerge. Use this section to capture the essence of your team's current dynamics.
- Action steps: Document specific actions your team plans to take to address areas for improvement or capitalize on strengths.

### **Using Qualitative Results**

This qualitative section aligns with the quantitative assessment, providing a comprehensive tool for understanding and improving the school's climate.

- Analyze themes: Look for recurring themes in responses to identify common strengths or areas of concern.
- **Pair with quantitative data:** Use these insights to contextualize quantitative scores and understand underlying reasons for high or low ratings.
- Actionable feedback: Translate qualitative themes into specific actions or initiatives to improve the school's climate.
- **Communicate findings:** Share the results with staff, emphasizing the importance of their feedback and outlining steps for improvement.

### **Using Audit Results**

This audit is a tool for fostering reflection, dialogue, and actionable insights to cultivate a thriving school climate that supports an effective school culture.

- Analyze quantitative scores: Identify components with lower average ratings to prioritize improvement.
- Review qualitative responses: Look for common themes in open-ended answers to understand nuanced perceptions.
- Map climate positivity and stability:
  - + **Positivity:** High scores in a majority of climate components indicate a positive climate.
  - + **Stability:** Consistent ratings across different teams and time periods reflect a stable climate.
- Identify culture implications: Connect the audit findings to the broader cultural vision, values, and goals, addressing areas where the climate might inhibit performance or well-being.
